## Story of Hope Collaboration Brings Life & School Success

Like many small, rural districts across North Dakota, Wilton Public Schools was limited in supporting students with needs outside of the classroom — especially when it came to helping families navigate the complicated web of community resources.

"We have had families that we just cannot do enough for because we don't have the resources, the staff, or the time to really be able to help them," said Wilton Elementary Principal Macy Wood. To bridge the gap between homes, schools, and communities, they began a partnership with Nexus-PATH Family Healing to begin offering Targeted Case Management services in their district.

Wilton's Nexus-PATH case manager has formed incredible bonds with students and their families. Since January, eight students have received a range of support from help accessing food to just having a trusted confidante to talk to.

The last year has been challenging for so many. The pandemic escalated issues that were already difficult and mental health challenges rose exponentially from this situation. We see it in the headlines, we feel it at home, and at Nexus, we have seen demand for our services grow substantially.

With increasing challenges and greater need, we believe that partnership offers the greatest opportunity to make a positive difference. For Nexus, this means growing our community mental health programs to provide more prevention and intervention services that can avert the need for more critical care later.

This past year, Nexus partnered with other organizations and communities to launch a handful of new programs to help children and families and fill the gaps, one of those being the Southeast Regional Crisis Center, a 24/7 mental health crisis center, in Rochester, Minnesota.

The day after opening the center, a couple came into the facility with their granddaughter and asked for a tour. Their granddaughter struggles with schizophrenia and often relied on emergency rooms to get her through difficult times. These loving grandparents wanted her to see the center, know where it was located, and become familiar with it just in case she needed it in the future. She now has a welcoming place to go when she's struggling that can specifically focus on her mental health crisis.

This is the exact type of support we can provide to our communities as we continue to partner to develop innovative services. We are focused on offering care that reaches children and families when and where they need it most, and look forward to what the future brings for Nexus.

### **Family Focus** Nexus-Gerard saved Zack & our family

Zack, a 13-year-old boy, was spiraling out of control. He was struggling with worsening anxiety and aggression, and his parents, Tracy and Wendy, were the targets of his aggression. He was emotionally and physically attacking them and destroying their property. They spent many days in and out of emergency rooms and inpatient hospital stays, but these visits were band-aid solutions.

Zack was on 15 different medications and his psychiatrist was concerned that they were causing more harm than good. Zack struggled with making friends and started sharing suicidal ideations, saying he didn't want to live anymore. Wendy and Tracy were running out of options. They researched the 5-state area and finally found Nexus-Gerard.

They recall what it was like dropping Zack off at Nexus-Gerard for the first time. "It was the hardest thing we've ever had to do," Wendy says. "We live an hour and a half away, so we drove down, sat outside for 10 minutes, and said goodbye. Then we sobbed the entire drive back home," Tracy shares.

Zack spent seven months at Nexus-Gerard; his medications were reset and he learned coping skills for his anger and aggression and how to communicate his feelings. "Zack is able to tell us what he needs now, he couldn't do that before," says Wendy.

"If Nexus-Gerard didn't exist, Zack would either be dead or in jail," Tracy says as tears well up in her eyes. "Nexus-Gerard saved Zack and our family." Wendy puts her hand on her chest and adds in, "They helped our family go back to how we wanted our family to be. We can now have a family dinner or a movie night. We couldn't do that before."

"Those are eight kids that I don't lie awake thinking that we don't know how to help, or we can't get them the services that they need," Wood said.

One of these children is 10-year-old Allie<sup>\*</sup>, who quietly shared her dream of playing softball with her Nexus-PATH case manager. The case manager helped Allie join a team and even drove her to games, taking Allie's entire family out for ice cream afterward.

With a smile, Wood said, "Allie would come by our office with a huge grin on her face and tell us about her games. It's an amazing feeling to know that you can help kids...and know that probably wouldn't have happened without Nexus-PATH."
